CATALOG DESCRIPTION:

An introductory course that examines the biological, archaeological, linguistic, and cultural basis of anthropology as it was developed in the USA. Overview of theories and methods used in anthropological study.

RATIONALE:

As a survey course, this course introduces students to all subfields of anthropology giving them a general understanding of the entire discipline in the holistic manner that was developed in the US. Through the anthropological perspective, students will appreciate the human cultural and biological diversity across time and space. This course paves the way for further study in anthropology and fulfills part of the Liberal Education social science requirement.

1. Demonstrate knowledge of the foundation of Anthropology and its main subfields: biological, archaeological, linguistic, and cultural.
 2. Demonstrate knowledge about core notions and theoretical approaches of general anthropology.
 3. Identify anthropological methods of data collection from both emic and etic perspectives.
 4. Develop an anthropological perspective in the study of humanity within diverse historical and global contexts.

METHOD OF TEACHING AND LEARNING:
