**CATALOG DESCRIPTION:**

Deep dive into a current topic or methodology in contemporary art practice. The topics of the seminar will be chosen to reflect changing research and supplement the existing visual arts program. Students produce creative projects that reflect changing social, ecological and technological contexts.

**RATIONALE:**

The seminar allows students to work on research-directed projects, putting the analytical and critical skills they have acquired in the program to use to realize a larger creative project. Methodologies and collaborative skills employed will help prepare students for postgraduate study or professional projects.

**LEARNING OUTCOMES:**

Upon successful completion of this course, the student should be able to:

1. Demonstrate ability to undertake independent and collaborative research on a specific topic, including the use of scholarly sources, research on artists, and practice-based research.
2. Analyze critical debates and scholarly views related to the topic under investigation.
3. Utilize relevant techniques in 2D, 3D and 4D toward the completion of a substantial project.
4. Apply professional standards of presentation, reflection, and documentation.

**METHOD OF TEACHING AND LEARNING:**

In congruence with the teaching and learning strategy of the college, the following tools are used:

- Classes consist of lectures, demonstrations, and problem-solving sessions, class critiques and discussions.
- Studios: students are encouraged to use studio facilities for the completion and installation of their works.
- Media labs: students use media labs for the completion of projects and portfolios
- Gallery and museum visits
- Office hours: students are encouraged to make full use of the office hours of their instructor, where they can ask questions and go over lecture and reading material.
- Online platform (i.e. Blackboard,MS Team), where instructors post lecture notes, assignment instructions, timely announcements, as well as additional resources.
