DESCRIPTION: Ancient Egyptian art and architecture from 4000 B.C. to

the Ptolemaic period. Concentration on the three major

periods: Old, Middle and New Kingdoms.

RATIONALE: This course is designed for students interested in

broadening their knowledge of Egyptian art and civilization, so important in the history of the ancient

Mediterranean basin.

LEARNING OUTCOMES: As a result of taking this course, the student should be able to:

1. Identify works of art and architecture by title, kingdom, date, medium and place of origin or location.

2. Classify the style of works; in architecture, explain plan and structural devices.

3. Discuss the historical, religious and cultural context of a work of art.

4. Define the major characteristics of each period of Egyptian art and architecture and understand its overall development.

- 5. Compare and contrast works of art and architecture in terms of style, form, function, patronage, and audience.
- 6. Engage with the major critical approaches to interpretation of Ancient Egyptian art and architecture.

METHOD OF

TEACHING AND LEARNING:

In congruence with the learning and teaching strategy of the college, the following tools are used:

- -Classes consist of lectures, in-class writing and interactive learning such as class and student-led discussions
- Use of field trips when possible.
- Use of visual materials
