CATALOG DESCRIPTION:

Using visuals, sound, and words together in news and feature formats. Objectivity and balance. Checking sources. Structuring stories. Camera use and shot selection.Researching, interviewing, shooting, writing, and producing a package story.

RATIONALE:

This course trains students in the techniques of television news story production. It is intended for students who intend to pursue a career in journalism or public relations.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

As a result of taking this course, the student should be able to:

- 1. Describe the visual, textual, and aural elements of storytelling and explain how they work together.
- 2. Understand how journalistic principles of accuracy, objectivity, balance, and fairness relate to the use of visuals and sound as well as words.
- 3. Create a well-structured a story that contains visuals, words, and sounds
- 4. Combine visuals and text in writing voice-overs.
- 5. Produce a complete package story.

METHOD OF TEACHING AND LEARNING:

In congruence with the learning and teaching strategy of the college, the following tools are used:

- Class lectures, interactive learning (class discussions, group work) video presentations, and in-class workshop exercises.
- Office hours: students are encouraged to make full use of the office hours of their instructor, where they can ask questions, see their exam paper, and/or go over lecture material.
- Use of a Blackboard site where instructors post lecture notes, assignment instructions, timely announcements, as well as additional resources.
- Peer tutoring is also available to students who choose to get additional help.

ASSESSMENT:

In-class examination of homework exercises – formative	0	Various writing and camera exercises
Package story – summative	50	Voiced and fully edited project, 2-4 minutes long
Final examination – summative	50	Essay-type/short answer questions; writing exercise

Formative assessment tests students' ability to understand and apply principles learned in class and through readings.
