PREREQUISITES:	WP 1010 Introduction to Academic Writing							
CATALOG DESCRIPTION:	An overview of the internal structure of word-forms. This course is useful for anyone who wishes to gain an insight into the nature of word formation.							
RATIONALE:	By focusing on a range of morphological phenomena (both in English and in other languages) the course helps students develop skills for pattern observation in data, description and analysis of word structure, and hypothesis formation. Students will also gain an understanding of how morphology relates to phonology, syntax and semantics.							
LEARNING OUTCOMES:	<p>Upon successful completion of this course, the student should be able to:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Identify morpheme structure in a variety of languages discovering and describing patterns in a theoretically informed way; 2. Demonstrate an understanding of the relationship between morphology, phonology, syntax and semantics; 3. Recognise principles of lexical and inflectional morphology; 4. Display knowledge of predicates, arguments and lexical entries.
