CATALOG DESCRIPTION:	Comprehensive review of theories and approaches to the analysis of written and oral texts. The course will be useful for anyone interested in exploring how language functions in different social, political and cultural contexts.			
RATIONALE:	This course explores the most recent and relevant approaches to discourse and provides students with the empirical tools for the analysis of different types of texts.			
LEARNING OUTCOMES:	 As a result of taking this course, the student should be able to: Show an understanding of different theories and approaches to Discourse Analysis; Apply the different tools of analysis on a variety of spoken and written texts; Critically evaluate work done in the field and understand the function of different discourse structures in their social, political and cultural contexts; Demonstrate ability to select appropriate literature and/or methodology to explore a field-related issue in written form. 			
METHOD OF TEACHING AND LEARNING:	 In congruence with the teaching and learning strategy of the college, the following tools are used: Lectures and class discussions. Homework assignments. Office hours held by the instructor to provide further assistance to students. Use of library facilities for further study and preparation for the exams Use of the Blackboard course management platform to further support communication, by posting lecture notes, assignment instruction, timely announcements, formative quizzes and online submission of assignments. 			
ASSESSMENT:	Summative: 1st assessment: Portfolio of Data Analysis Assignments (approximately 2000 words in total). Timely submission of all the preparatory work is required. Final assessment: Research Paper 3,000-3,500 paper (minimum 14 sources) on a pre-approved topic; will require collection and analysis of data; use of secondary sources.
