PREREQUISITES:

CATALOG DESCRIPTION:

The study of the interactions between the physical environment, social organization and social behavior. Focus on both local and global dimensions of social behaviors and their environmental impact.

RATIONALE:

The course helps the student develop a structured understanding of the organization of society in connection to the environment. The course focuses on a number of important dimensions of this connection, such as social class, consumption, globalization, and environmental movements. The student gains the necessary background knowledge for a more holistic understanding of the environment, as it is becoming the leading global concern of the 21st century, by studying social structures, social behaviors as well as the role of culture.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- As a result of taking this course, the student should be able to:
1. Demonstrate understanding of the social dimensions and social implications of environmental issues.
 2. Explain and discuss the role of socio-economic processes in affecting the environment and leading to present environmental problems.
 3. Discuss the impact of the ecology movement on the present state of environmental issues.
 4. Explain and discuss the impact of the environment on the organization of societies.

METHOD OF TEACHING AND LEARNING:

- In congruence with the teaching and learning strategy of the college, the following tools are used:
- Classes consist of lectures, showing of video documentaries and experiential learning activities involving illustrations of various issues.
 - Office hours: students are encouraged to make full use of the office hours of their lecturer, where they can address issues pertinent to the course material and ask questions.
 - Use of a blackboard site, where instructors post lecture notes, assignment instructions, timely announcements, as well as additional resources.
