CATALOG DESCRIPTION:	Introduction to management concepts and theories for healthcare organizations. External and internal environments of organizations are identified, as well as key management functions, roles, and responsibilities. Essential aspects of healthcare management are addressed.	
RATIONALE:	The module explores fundamental concepts of management theory as applied to health care. By taking this module students develop an understanding of the issues in healthcare management, such as strategic planning and marketing, information technology, human resources and ethical issues in the industry. Students will examine the organizational structure of the health care delivery system and administrative processes such as problem solving and decision making.
