RATIONALE:	The main objective of this course is to provide students with foundational knowledge of world history and to familiarize them with past cultures and peoples from around the world. Such knowledge and familiarity is crucial in a contemporary world of growing global interdependence and cultural contact and may also serve as a foundation for higher-level courses in many fields that assume such general knowledge.
