## **DEREE COLLEGE SYLLABUS FOR: HY 3026 MIDDLE EAST: POWER AND IDEOLOGY UK LEVEL: 5** (Previously: Middle East: A Crossroad) **UK CREDITS:15** (Updated Fall 2025) **US CREDITS: 3/0/3** None **PREREQUISITES: CATALOG** The course is intended to provide an analysis of the regional politics of **DESCRIPTION:** the Middle East since the Ottoman empire, and of their interaction with issues of international security, global resources, and great power politics. **RATIONALE:** This course is vital in analyzing the phenomenon of political Islam by situating its emergence in the context of regional and international developments. It provides a historical understanding in the developments of Middle East politics **LEARNING OUTCOMES:** As a result of taking this course, the student should be able to: 1. Examine the role of the pre-modern Empires in the region as well as the changes that the advent of Modernity brought in the region, focusing on Political Islam. 2. Assess the impact of European power politics and conflicts on the Middle East. 3. Consider various stakeholders in the politics of the region- from state to non-state actors, and public opinion. 4.
