RATIONALE:	The former Soviet Union cannot be understood without an assessment of the conditions that made its existence possible.	
LEARNING OUTCOMES:	As a result of taking this course, the students should be able to: 1. Explain the failure of tsarist autocracy. 2. Evaluate the impact of revolution and reform on the autocratic system and its relative success or failure. 3. Analyse the contributions of Lenin, Trotsky, Stalin, Khrushchev and the subsequent Soviet leadership, and differentiate between their respective domestic and foreign policies. 4. Outline the USSR's rise to superpower status. 5. Formulate a coherent, factual interpretation of the reasons for and results of the Cold War.
