<b>CATALOG DESCRIPTION:</b>	The role and significance of research in the domain of international relations. Formulation and clarification of research questions and problems, writing literature review, designing research, data collection and analysis, interpretation of findings, argumentation on problem resolution.
<b>RATIONALE:</b>	The study of international relations involves the description of political phenomena, issues, and problems, which are analysed based on theoretical perspectives, reflected upon in a methodological way. In this course, students will be acquainted with qualitative and quantitative research methods that will enable them to assess, interpret and evaluate political events, political behaviour, the role of individuals and political institutions. It also provides students with a basis of conducting self-directed research activities.

Examine a range of qualitative and quantitative methods and techniques used in research.</li> <li>2. Understand the basic steps of drafting a research proposal.</li> <li>3. Critically evaluate different theoretical perspectives in the domain of international relations as part of a research project.</li> </ol>
