CATALOG DESCRIPTION:	Current internal and external forces driving European foreign, security and defence policy designs. Key factors involved in shaping the European security environment. The European Union's presence on the international stage as an economic, diplomatic, military and 'soft' power and future perspectives.
RATIONALE:	This module equips students with the conceptual tools necessary to understand the factors that shape European foreign, security and defence policies. Students gain awareness of the EU as an economic 'superpower', with huge leverage in the areas of international trade, investment, finance and foreign assistance; as a major military power; and as an unrivalled projector of 'soft power'. Students become cognizant of the current debate regarding the future of the European security structure and direction, including its future relationships with the US and NATO. Through a focused analysis of case-studies, the module illustrates the on-going wider policy debates and challenges.
LEARNING OUTCOMES:	As a result of taking this course, the students should be able to: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Demonstrate understanding of the process of European integration and its relationship with the broader fields of international relations, international economic relations, and foreign, security and defence issues. 2. Analyse key developments problems and issues that have configured Europe's security environment and architecture with reference to the role of the key national, international and transnational state and non-state actors. 3. Examine and critically evaluate various perspectives, future challenges and policy options in sensitive international relations and defence issues facing Europe's security environment.
METHOD OF TEACHING AND LEARNING:	In congruence with the learning and teaching strategy of the college, the following tools are used: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ Classes consist of lectures, video presentations, discussions revolving around the content of the assigned readings, problem-solving exercises. Specialized video presentations familiarize students with professional skills and further develop their cognitive skills. ➤ Office hours: Students are encouraged to make full use of the office hours of their instructor, where they can discuss the course material. ➤ Use of blackboard site, where instructors post lecture notes, assignments instructions, timely announcements, as well as additional resources. ➤ Use of library facilities: Students are encouraged to make use of the
