CATALOG DESCRIPTION:	Legal aspects of national and international shipping. Historical dimension of global shipping and the development of the modern Greek and Greek-owned fleet since the last quarter of the 20th century. Legal structure of shipping companies, shipping contracts, legal aspects of ship finance, national, EU and International regulatory framework of shipping, marine insurance, collisions, pilotage, towage, salvage, general average, marine pollution, limitation of liability of the ship-owner.	
RATIONALE:	This course is intended for students who, in their prospective managerial careers, will find themselves directly or indirectly involved in cases concerning technical, economic, political and legal problems arising from shipping practice. It also provides knowledge and understanding of the various aspects of marine insurance, [e.g. hull, cargo, liability, protection and indemnity (P&I), Freight, Demurrage and Defence (FD&D)], and the way they interrelate with the various operations of the shipping industry
