CATALOG DESCRIPTION:

In-depth investigation of a musicological topic. The topic of the seminar will bring to focus selected musical issues leading to further investigation and research.

RATIONALE:

In this seminar, the instructor will select an area of focus for the class lectures and discussions. The seminar allows students to hone the research, score reading, analytical and critical skills that they have acquired in the program and serves as preparation for postgraduate study.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- After successfully completing this course students should be able to:
1. Critically discuss music in its historical, cultural and social-political contexts.
 2. Organize and develop an independent research project.
 3. Evaluate and utilize musical and source materials in support of musicological work.
 4. Discuss and defend independent work in an oral presentation.

METHOD OF TEACHING AND LEARNING:

- In congruence with the teaching and learning strategy of the college, the following tools are used:
- lectures on the selected topic, class discussions and group work during class meetings;
 - critical analysis and in class discussion of materials;
 - listening and score reading, aided by audiovisual media;
 - oral presentation reviews supported by audio/audiovisual media;
 - office hours: students are encouraged to make full use of their instructor’s office hours, where they can ask questions, see their assigned work results and/or go over lecture material;
 - use of a learning management system (Blackboard) where instructors post lecture notes, assignment instructions, announcements and additional resources;
 - support from the Student Academic Support Services (SASS), who offer one-to-one and group workshop sessions to support the development of academic and study skills.

INDICATIVE CONTENT:	<p>Content varies according to seminar topic.</p> <p>Tutorials:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Roughly half of the contact hours will be dedicated to tutorials • Students will detail their project progress and discuss the issues raised and future plans of work with the tutor. • These tutorials will be central to the formation of each student project. <p>Lectures:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The remaining half of contact hours will be lecture based • Schedule will be detailed by the module tutor in cooperation with the students. • Overview of the field of higher-level musical research, including current directions and activities in fields relevant to the student projects currently planned. • Case studies exploring selected articles and creative works as appropriate, allowing students to practice evaluating such materials and examining the ideas and research context in which they exist.
