CATALOG DESCRIPTION:	In depth analysis of classical philosophical texts and/or a philosophical issue. Systematic and critical study of its key concepts and arguments. Appreciation of the historical context and the impact on contemporary philosophical thought. Special emphasis on the development of skills required for the analysis and presentation of a philosophical position.	
RATIONALE:	Through the senior thesis students are offered the opportunity to enhance their critical and interpretative skills as well as their originality in thinking through an in-depth analysis of a philosophical issue and/or primary philosophical texts related to it. Indispensable to all philosophy students and especially for those who wish to prepare themselves for postgraduate studies.	
LEARNING OUTCOMES:	As a result of taking this course, the student should be able to: 1. Undertake extensive and comprehensive research of scholarly sources concentrating on a focused topic related to a philosophical issue or a major philosophical work. 2. Demonstrate an advanced understanding of the critical debates and argumentation on the topic under examination, assessing the value of relevant sources and interpretations in a systematic and scholarly manner. 3. Deliver in an engaged manner an oral presentation of the main conceptual themes discussed and the position followed in the thesis. 4. Demonstrate mastery in interpretative and critical skills in relation to the philosophical issue and/or primary source under research. 5. Demonstrate originality in philosophical thinking.
