CATALOG DESCRIPTION:	Examination of the historical foundations of religious influence on politics and the contemporary intersections between politics and religion across the world. Critical assessment of the role of religious actors, institutions, and ideologies in policymaking, state-building, democratic politics, regime change, conflict, war, and other political processes.	
RATIONALE:	Politics and religion influence each other - pervasively and controversially - in several complex ways. This course will examine this relationship from a variety of perspectives, including historical, geographic, and ideological. The course aims to develop students' capacity to better understand and to debate the nature of intersections between politics and religion in various cultural, religious and geographic settings. Given the broad range of global conflicts linked, whether superficially or essentially, to religion, we will assess a rather sharp debate in the scholarly literature over the place of religion in international relations.	
LEARNING OUTCOMES:	 As a result of taking this course, the student should be able to: 1. Apply the theoretical and analytical tools for understanding the interplay of politics and religion 2. Evaluate the broad historical evolution of the place of religion in the public sphere 3. Critically analyze the pervasiveness of political use of religion as a mechanism for identity building and cultural revolution 4. Explain variations in the interplay between politics and religion across different religious, cultural, and geographic contexts 5. Apply analytical skills in forming and defending their own points of view and understanding of the interplay of politics and religion
