<b>CATALOG DESCRIPTION:</b>	A systematic examination of the application behavioral science and mental health principles to the justice system topics include criminal investigation, insanity defense, eyewitness and expert witness testimony, child custody disputes as well as police and correctional psychology.	
<b>RATIONALE:</b>	This module provides students with an in-depth understanding of how psychological expertise can be applied to problems faced by judges, attorneys, police officials. Designed primarily - but not exclusively - for psychology majors, the module examines the psychologist's role in a number of processes related to civil, criminal, or administrative justice.

Critically evaluate the basic issues pertaining to the commitment to and release from mental institutions, insanity defense, competency to stand trial, jury selection, eye-witness testimony and expert witness testimony.</li> <li>3.
