CATALOG DESCRIPTION:	Introduction to the basic conventions of sociological research and writing; practices for the construction of sophisticated and well-structured arguments; issues of readership and communication within expert communities; methods and criteria for search and review the existing sociological literature on an assigned topic; sociological reading and writing skills.
RATIONALE:	This workshop-style course aims at introducing students to the distinct (secondary) research practices and writing conventions required for the study and analysis of various sociological fields of study. Library research and critical reading skills, as well as familiarization with different forms of writing in the social sciences are essential for all sociology students. As such, the course will equip students with some basic but indispensable skills and will serve as a foundation for advanced modules.
LEARNING OUTCOMES:	Upon completion of this module students will be able to: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Examine the content of texts and the quality of knowledge claims. 2. Demonstrate knowledge and understanding of sociological research practices and writing conventions. 3. Identify and summarize (appropriate) sociological sources relevant to a specific topic. 4. Make use of some basic search tools and resources and develop understanding about how relevant software programs can facilitate and expedite the research process.
METHOD OF TEACHING AND LEARNING:	In congruence with the teaching and learning strategy of the college, the following tools are used: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ Classes consist of interactive lectures, critical discussions, library visits, and group-work. ➤ Analysis of abstracts, texts, and various knowledge claims, critical summaries and reviews, note-taking tasks. ➤ Use of software programs (e.g., NVivo) will also be demonstrated to inform students on how it can be used to navigate relevant literature. ➤ Office hours: students are encouraged to make full use of the office hours of their lecturer, where they can address issues pertinent to the course material, ask questions and seek guidance on their assignments. ➤ Use of a blackboard site, where instructors post ppts, reading materials, useful links, assignment instructions,
