Mission

The B.A. (Hons) in Theatre Arts delivers to students a well-balanced study of histories, practices, and philosophies that shape contemporary theatre and performance. The programme is specifically designed to develop technical skills in performing, directing, dramaturgy, performance-making, and design as well as critical skills that connect theories, theatre and performance traditions, and individual practice to broader cultural, social, and historical concerns. Students are exposed to a wide range of opportunities in order to equip them with the appropriate tools to become successful professionals in today's national and international environment within the Cultural Industries. Students completing the program will be able to pursue graduate studies in theatre and performance.

Educational Aims and Objectives

- Prepare students to a high level of technical performance competence and creative abilities that will enable them to seek employment within the performing arts sector and related professions in Greece and abroad.
- Develop students' critical and analytical skills in order to reflect on their creative practice and that of others and thus locate their artistic practice - within a sociocultural and historical context.
- Develop modes of intellectual enquiry and research skills appropriate to the understanding of theatre, drama and performance.
- Build bridges into the profession through regular encounter with theatre and performance artists and related practitioners.
- Develop ability of autonomy and self-determination through the cultivation of the student's individual artistic voice necessary to succeed in a global environment.

In accordance with the framework for higher education qualifications the Diploma of Higher Education in Theatre Arts (Dip HE) is awarded to students who have completed 240 credits comprising of 120 credits at Level 1 (FHEQ Level 4) (120 credits, 8 15-credit modules) and 120 at Level 2 (FHEQ Level 5) 5 (120 credits, 8 15-credit modules). Upon completion students should have acquired (i) a broader understanding of various modes of Practice within contemporary performance (performance, design and directing) (ii) a deeper understanding of the applications of technology and interdisciplinary Practice in the field and (iii) further competencies in studio Practice.

II b. Bachelor of Arts Ordinary in Theatre Arts

Upon completion of 300 credits (20 15 credit modules) of which a minimum of 60 should be at Level 3 (FHEQ level 6) students will have acquired (i) more focused skills in performance Practice (ii) further skills in critically evaluating concepts and (iii) greater competency in presenting creative projects through specialized theatre performance and production modules.

Academic Advising

All students are assigned an academic advisor responsible for assisting them in gaining the greatest benefit from their educational experience at the College. Good academic advising is a vital part of the learning process and an integral part of the basic teaching function of the College. Effective academic advising provides specific aid to students in considering and completing academic programs, but it goes beyond mere course scheduling; it includes planning, decision making, implementation, and evaluation of academic, personal, and career-related matters, and exploration. The College assigns all entering freshmen a First-Year advisor from the Office of Academic Advising. Thereafter, the advising program is faculty-based and fosters personal contact between students and faculty. Department Heads and Program Coordinators act as educational consultants.

New incoming students and continuing Deree-ACG students are required to consult every semester and during the announced advising period with an advisor at the Office of Academic Advising.

Advisors never make decisions for students. Their overriding objective is to assist students in developing the maturity required to make their own choices and to be responsible for the consequences of those choices.

Student Orientation

The **Registrar** offers a presentation on the dual award system and its academic policies during the New Student Orientation day. The New Student Orientation



Program introduces incoming students to the campus, the academic system (dual OU/Deree awards), College rules and regulations, and academic and social life. Students receive information on student programs and services such as advising, financial aid, and co-curricular activities.

Disability Status and Provisions

Students are responsible for alerting the Educational Psychologist to a special need, and for providing relevant documentary evidence. The Educational Psychologist suggests actions to be taken to accommodate a student with special needs, having ensured that there has been full consultation with faculty in the department(s) responsible for the assessment of that student. The accommodation is approved by the Committee of Disabilities and Learning Differences. This action must be endorsed by the Chair of the relevant Board of Examiners in the case of the validated award. Information, guidance and support are provided to all disabled students who declare their disabilities. Students with learning difficulties may be eligible for special accommodations, such as extra time for examination completion, and receive support and counselling from the Educational Psychologist on campus. The College announced the establishment of the **Counselling Centre** in September 2015, with the aim to support, encourage, educate, counsel, and empower students in a college setting as they adjust to the challenges and transition of university life where needed.

Academic Societies offer students the opportunity to engage and collaborate with faculty in an academic discipline, attend lectures and seminars and participate in a wide range of activities that provide deeper engagement in a particular subject area. The Governing Body of the Theatre Arts Society represents Theatre Arts students for academic matters and the organization of extra-curricular events. They communicate with the faculty and administration.

The **Student Handbook** provides detailed information about the Theatre Arts programme, all aspects related to pursuing an OU award at Deree, as well as guidance to prospective and current students. Individual program student handbooks are available on the ACG website.

Work-based Learning - Internship Opportunities

The College cooperates with a number of multinational companies (e.g. the Libra Group, Diageo, Coca-Cola HBC, etc.) and offers all students international internship placements, often combined with study abroad opportunities.

The Office of Student Affairs is dedicated to promoting student development and enhancing the quality of student life. Through extra-curricular activities the College strives to provide students with opportunities parallel to the classroom experience that are consistent with its educational values. The students are encouraged to explore personal and professional goals by participating in clubs, societies, organizations and athletic teams. Office of Student Affairs co-curricular activities include social, cultural and recreational clubs that allow students to pursue their interests and, at the same time, provide opportunities for leadership.

Student Retention



The American College of Greece pays close attention to the progression of students from admission to graduation. The goal of the Office of Retention is to help students stay in college while taking advantage of opportunities ACG offers, and graduate on time to realize their full potential.

The **Student Success Centre** (SSC) is designed as a one-stop service point for students. The primary purpose of SSC is to simplify the interactions between students and the College. Among other services, the SSC issues student IDs; credentials for the college's online services; accepts student requests for various certificates and petitions related to their studies; processes requests for course withdrawals; and guides students to the appropriate offices for matters related to registration, academic advising, validation, transfer credit, and tuition payment. The SSC is open extended hours (M-Th. 8:00-19:00 and Fri. 8:00-18:00) in order to be accessible to students.

The Office of Career Services offers centralized, comprehensive and coordinated career development, through appointments, sessions, workshops, job and internship opportunities and online resources, building relationships and longstanding collaborations between students/alumni and potential employers. During the last year the Office of Career Services has expanded its online services. More specifically, via the office's main platform called the Career Portal students can participate in a Virtual Career Fair to connect directly with employers via videoconferencing, have Video Interview Practice where they record their answers to interview questions and receive feedback from a counselor, and register to a Mock Interview with an experienced recruiter. The Career Portal also has shortcuts to two additional platforms, HigherEd and Goinglobal, where students can find information opportunities for jobs or internships worldwide, including Covid-19 related information to find remote opportunities per country. The office moved dynamically to the era of social media utilizing Instagram, additionally to Facebook and LinkedIn.

The quality of the services offered, transforms the Office of Career Services into a hub for career-related issues. The variety of programs and services offered to students and alumni include:

- access to local and international job and internship positions as well as work study positions and the administration of the Local and International Internship program
- counseling sessions (online or on campus) on selection of study area, career advising and graduate studies advising
- an online test which identifies strengths and personality preferences aiming to assist the students in their selection of a major
- skills workshops on variety of subjects including job search, job interview techniques, CV building
- assessment center tests for practice
- career networking events; Career Days where the students have the opportunity to have a short interview with a company representative

Career Days takes place annually on campus for 45 consecutive years. This year Career Days were implemented as a Virtual Career Fair, hosted on the Career Portal. The event typically lasts for a week and includes: training sessions/workshops, mock



interviews, CV preparation in view of four days of company visits on campus. More than a hundred companies participate each year. During these days all Deree students have the chance to be interviewed by company representatives either for consideration for an immediate job or internship opening or for their qualifications to be perceived by these representatives, something which may lead to future employment opportunities. Representatives from the Theatre industry will be present in these events.

The Admissions Process

To qualify for admission to the academic programs of the College, applicants must demonstrate that they possess the appropriate qualifications to enable them to be successful in the program of their choice. Candidates are evaluated based on their academic performance, proficiency in English, and overall student profile (i.e.: letter of recommendation, personal statement, personal interview, extracurricular activities and work experience.

All applicants must possess a secondary education completion Certificate such as a Greek High School Apolyterion, an International Baccalaureate Diploma, a French Baccalaureate, a German "Abitur" or an equivalent secondary education completion Certificate as defined in the NAFSA Guide to World Education Systems or must have passed at least 8 IGCSE/GCSE/GCE subjects. Applicants who have completed their secondary education in a school in Greece that does not award an Apolyterion must possess a secondary education completion Certificate from one of the Schools that are officially recognized by the Greek Ministry of Education.

Moreover, the standard minimum average grade entry requirement shown on the secondary education completion Certificate as defined above is the following: 14/20 in the Greek Apolyterion, an overall average grade of 2.5/4.0 in a US style school, 24 and above in the International Baccalaureate or the equivalent of any other educational grading system. Applicants whose grades are between 12/20 and 13.99/20 on a Greek Apolyterion or the equivalent grades for students who hold a secondary education completion Certificate as defined above, may be admitted to the College on a provisional basis.

Students admitted on a provisional basis will be required to fulfill the following conditions in order to be allowed to continue on their selected major after the completion of one academic year after their acceptance to Deree.

- Meet with an assigned advisor at the Academic Advising Office at least twice every month or whenever the advisor thinks it is necessary. The assigned advisor will monitor the student progress very closely and may require that they seek academic help through the Student Academic Support Services.
- The number of courses students will be allowed to register for will be determined by their English Language Placement (see section "Evidence of Proficiency in English").



However, in no case will they be allowed to register for a total of more than 2 courses if placed in EAP 1002 or for more than 4 courses if placed in WP1010. Students with provisional status who are placed in EAP 1000, EAP 1001 must first complete their English for Academic Purpose courses before they begin taking College level courses along with EAP 1002.

- Students who have successfully completed only the EAP sequence during their first academic year will be able to continue.
- Achieve a minimum cumulative average (CI) of at least 2.0 after one academic year.
- After the completion of one academic year on provisional status, students' performance will be reviewed bythe Committee on Academic Standards and Policies (CASP), which will decide on student progression and/or new conditions.
- Students on provisional status are subject to the College probation policy (see section "Academic Probation").

The following is required for all freshmen applicants:

- 1. Completed application form
- 2. Personal statement
- 3. Letter of recommendation from an academic teacher or professor
- 4. Official secondary school transcript(s) and diploma(s)
- 5. Certified copy of the state identity card or a valid passport for non-Greek citizens (and residence permit, if applicable)
- 6. Evidence of proficiency in English.

Candidates are required to schedule an interview with a designated College representative after all application material has been submitted in order to assess their profile.

All applicants must demonstrate proficiency in the English language either by taking the College's English Placement Test (Oxford Online Placement Test) or by submitting any evidence derived from one of the following tests:

Applicants presenting a TOEFL score should arrange to have the test results sent directly to the Office of Admissions by the Educational Testing Service (ETS). The College's Institution Code Number is 0925. TOEFL scores are valid for 2 years.

Students may also qualify to take WP 1010 by submitting evidence of fluency based on graduation from an English speaking secondary school or program.

The above listed grades qualify the student for placement directly into WP 1010.

Applicants who do not qualify for WP1010 but who otherwise show academic promise are required to follow the English for Academic Purposes Program (see section "Academic Writing").

8. Information about non-OU standard assessment regulations (including PSRB requirements)

The assessment methods for each module are included in the module syllabus and made known to the student through: a) the course information packet which is given to all students on the first day of classes and b) postings on Blackboard. The programme uses a variety of summative assessments which directly connect to the Learning Outcomes and measure the mastery of students' knowledge and understanding, cognitive, creative as well as technical and practical skills. Mark schemes are used for each type of summative assessment which comprise a number of criteria for testing the degree to which the students have achieved these outcomes. A sample of the assessments is second marked and this sample is reviewed by the External Examiner. Grades are ratified by the Board of Examiners. Several courses also include formative assessments which do not contribute to the mark of the module but provide valuable opportunities for learning and offering feedback to students.

Assessment Procedure (Regulatory Framework)

ASSESSMENT, PROGRESSION AND AWARD OF CREDIT

- 10.0 The forms of assessment and its weighting and timing, and the ways in which the learning outcomes are to be demonstrated through assessment, are set out in the module and programme specifications approved by The Open University at the point of validation.
- 10.1Each programme handbook contains comprehensive details of the assessment scheme as approved by The Open University in the validation process.
- 11.0 Minimum requirements for pass
- 11.1To obtain an Open University award students are required to complete all parts of the programme's approved assessment and comply with all regulations relating to their programme of study.
- 11.2The minimum aggregate pass marks for The Open University validated awards are: 40% for undergraduate programmes50% for postgraduate programmes. These minima may apply to assessment elements as stated in the wording of the module specifications, but will apply to modules, stages and qualifications.
- 12.0 Identification of requirements from professional, statutory and regulatory bodies
- 12.1Additional academic regulations required by any professional, statutory or recognised regulatory body will be set out in the relevant programme specification and approved by The Open University in the validation process.13.0Submission of assessed work
- 13.1Work submitted for a summative assessment component cannot be amended after submission, or re-submitted.
- 13.2Student requests for extensions to assessment deadlines will not be approved unless made in accordance with published partner institution guidelines as approved by The Open University.
- 13.3 Where coursework is submitted late and there are no accepted extenuating circumstances it will be penalised in line with the following tariff: Submission within 6 working days: a 10% reduction deducted from the overall marked score for each working day late, down to the 40% pass mark (for UG) and 50% pass mark (PG awards) and no further. Submission that is late by 7 or more working days: submission refused, mark of 0. A working day is defined by the partner and submission after the deadline will be assumed to be the next working day. Students who fail to submit work for assessments or attend examinations shall be deemed to have failed the assessment components concerned and will be marked as 0.



27.0 Authority of Boards of Examiners

- 27.1 The Board of Examiners is authorised to determine the progression of students in accordance with these academic regulations and to recommend progression or the conferment of validated awards of The Open University.
- 27.2 All progression and award recommendations are made to The Open University's Module Results Approval and Qualifications Classification Panel (MRAQCP) for them to ratify. The Panel is responsible for approving recommendations for module results and the award and Classification of qualifications (including partner institutions).
- 27.3 All decisions related to a student's progression, final results, and awards, will be approved by a properly constituted Board of Examiners.
- 27.4 No other body has authority to recommend conferment of an award or progression, nor to amend the decision of an approved and properly constituted Board of Examiners acting within its terms of reference and in accordance with the regulations for the programme of study. A Board of Examiners may, however, be required to review a decision, or may have that decision annulled under the Appeals procedure.
- 28.0 Subsidiary Boards of Examiners
- 28.1 Any subsidiary board of examiners (with designated responsibility for a cognate group of units or subjects) will include all subject-based or cognate group External Examiners.
- 28.2 The rights and duties of External Examiners on subsidiary boards are the same as those of External Examiners on the parent board except that the subsidiary board of examiners only makes recommendations to the parent board.
- 28.3 Subsidiary boards will exercise responsibility for assessing students but will not make decisions on progression or awards. These will remain the responsibility of the parent Board of Examiners.
- 28.4 Once a subsidiary board has confirmed marks or grades for a student these will not normally be varied by the parent board although the parent board retains the authority to reach its own conclusion on the overall performance and grading of each student. It follows that, while a subsidiary board will be charged with recommending arrangements for reassessment of a failed student, only the parent board having confirmed the fail and determined a student's right to retrieve can approve the reassessment arrangements.

10. Methods for evaluating and improving the quality and standards of teaching and learning.

Programmes use the following direct and indirect methods for evaluating and improving the quality of teaching:



- On line Course Evaluation for each module (through CourseEval). This is submitted anonymously by students in all modules. Following submission of grades, results are sent electronically to the Provost, the Deans, the Department Heads/Programme Coordinators and the course instructor. They are also available to the President and the VP of Human Resources. Results are taken into consideration both in terms of improving teaching but also evaluating faculty.
- Senior Exit Survey: completed by all graduating students.
- Module Leader Reports where feedback from the course evaluations is also considered.
- Feedback from meetings between External Examiners and students.
- Departmental meetings with the student Academic Society.
- Representation of Academic Societies through their presidents in the Programme Committees. Student concerns are discussed and feedback is communicated back to the students by the relevant Society presidents.
- Student advising.
- Students may always express concerns to the Deans, the Provost or the President either individually or through the Student Association.

The College places high value on effective pedagogical Practices in the classroom by:

- Providing its faculty with the resources to improve the quality of instruction such as computers, smart classrooms, and electronic and print library resources, and training in new instructional technologies such as Blackboard.
- Supporting workshops, seminars, guest speakers, and retreats on best Practices in teaching.
- Supporting faculty in the organization and hosting of international conferences at ACG
- Supporting faculty on conference participation

The College is an institutional member of the Faculty Resource Network (FRN) at New York University. Established in 1984, the Network is an award-winning, nationally recognized faculty development initiative involving over 16,000 faculty members who teach more than 200,000 undergraduate students at a broad cross section of colleges and universities across the United States.

Deree-ACG is also a member of the Global Liberal Arts Alliance (GLAA), an international, multilateral partnership of American style liberal arts institutions with the goal of supporting excellence in liberal arts education on a transnational basis. The Great Lakes Colleges Association, based in Ann Arbor, Michigan, coordinates the activities and projects of the Alliance and was instrumental in its formation. There are presently 27 institutions representing 15 nations in the Alliance membership. GLAA's purpose is to exchange knowledge, expertise and experience among institutions committed to education in the tradition of the liberal arts and sciences.

Deree-ACG's Teaching and Learning Center (TLC) focuses on academic staff development. The goals of the TLC are to promote best Practice (both US and UK) in pedagogy by

- Offering programs which engage faculty in continuous improvement of Teaching.
- Supporting faculty in professional development in teaching.



- Promoting the value of teaching inside and outside the University Community.
- Encouraging faculty to explore new teaching methods and technologies.

Throughout the academic year the TLC organizes frequent training sessions on pedagogy and encourages faculty to explore developments in teaching technologies and adopt learner-centered Practices. Through a dedicated Blackboard container full of material related to classroom needs, which is made available to all DEREE instructors, TLC facilitates faculty efforts to keep up with best Practices in pedagogy.

10. Changes made to the programme since last (re)validation

The revised structure of the program indicates the introduction of the Performance strand as equal to the Theatre one. Combining a range of approaches, the program is designed as an interdisciplinary field of inquiry that offers students the opportunity to explore and think critically about the world-making power of theatre in the broadest sense; as a process, praxis, episteme and a means of intervening in the world. In order to provide students with advanced knowledge on professional arts protocols and creative entrepreneurship the program strengthens the acting, directing, design, academic theory and artistic research methodologies strands of the previous program and introduces a series of new modules.

The process towards revalidation started with an internal audit of the program in relation to Dance, Drama, Performance, QAA Subject Benchmarks Statement, 2019 (2007, 2015, 2019), level descriptors and EE reports for the period of revalidation.

The process led to the following considerations:

Fuller integration of theory and practice throughout the program:

The team agreed that there was a need to maintain the integration of theory and practice as outlined in EE reports (EE Report July 2020). The team agreed that there was a need to redistribute the critical/theory modules to ensure that students have acquired necessary skills at level 4 and 5 before progressing into the demands of level 6. We identified an 'overburden' of theory at level 6 with little preparation in level 5. The team also looked at the placement of these modules in relation to modules of practice. The team also looked to embed more theoretical/contextual content within modules of practice, to avoid a theory-practice dichotomy which was unwittingly prevalent in the former structure and cultivate an 'interplay between creative and critical modes of enquiry' (DDP 2019, 4.3, ii).

Summary of action:

DR 2010 Movement for the Stage. The notions of non-verbal communication and proxemics have been included in the description and rationale for theoretical understanding and practical elaboration in the context of the module, as they are valuable tools for the interpretation of a role. The course also offers an introduction to the fundamental elements of movement and to R. Laban's



Eukinetics and Choreutics as theoretical and practical tools that can further enhance movement development and its qualities on stage.

- DR 3116 Voice and Speech II. Considerable modifications are introduced in the syllabus to enhance integration of theory and practice. To enable students to make connections and actively apply knowledge from one course to the other, syllabi for voice and speech, movement and acting need to build on a common ground, expressly encouraging students to realize the affinities between subject matters and bring into their training and creative work skills from an integrated voice, movement, and performance repertoire. The redesign of this course is based on a threefold structure:
- Advanced use of the voice within specific contexts.
- Voice qualities and Laban movement efforts to create a vocal and physical map for the dramatic character.
- Voice work on the text: literary devices as generators of rhythmic and dynamic patterns.
- DR 3140 Acting the Scene. Fuller integration of theory and practice was considered for the changes made. In this module, we added one more learning outcome, because we want students to be able to design an acting score after analysis. This is a dynamic document that links theory and analysis to practice and can be used as a guide of action.
- DR 3339 Dramaturgy. It has been aimed a balance between practical and theoretical dramaturgy. Also, it has been pursued to provide a history of the dramaturgy, from ancient times to today, thus making the differences between dramaturgies explicit. At the same time, the use and importance of Dramaturgy in present performances is also more analytically approached and discussed. Therefore the module has been changed from DR 3139 Practical Dramaturgy to DR 3339 Dramaturgy emphasizing the importance of both Practical and Theoretical Dramaturgy.

Fuller integration of practice research methodologies in the design and structure of assessments.

The team agreed that there was a need to sustain and enhance the integration of practice research methodologies as suggested in EE reports (EE Report July 2020). Following EE feedback, the team considered a more dynamic intertwinement of the theoretical and practical components and a more developed integration of practice research methodologies.

Summary of action:

 DR 2336 Introduction to Performance: LOs and assessments in this new course are designed to introduce students to practice research methodologies.



- DR 3116 Voice and Speech II. Considerable modifications are introduced in the syllabus to enhance continuity and integrated structure within the program and integration of practice research methodologies in the design of the assessments: techniques honing the speech, the movement and the acting skills are all part of a voice body mind continuum that is essential to both text-based and devised performance.
- DR 3201 Movement for the Performer. Reflective paper that takes place after the Performance Presentation and includes the methodology supported by the theoretical and critical contexts.
- DR 3246 Performance as a Political & Social Act: Portfolio includes the theoretical/ critical support of the performance project.
- DR 3328 The Directing Process: Reflective presentation that takes place after the performance projects, includes the methodology supported by the theoretical and critical contexts.
- DR 3339 Dramaturgy: The first assessment aims on fostering the students'
 combined view on theatre, as both an art very much based on texts, as well as
 on praxis. In the second assessment they are expected to present a full
 dramaturgical proposal based on what they have been taught, taking into
 consideration specific spatial, social, and theatrical conditions.
- DR 3962 Collaborative Performance Practice. Portfolio that includes the theoretical and critical contexts that support the Final Performance Project.
- DR 4351 Physical Play and Devising: Reflective paper that takes place after the Devised Physical Performance and includes the methodology supported by the theoretical and critical contexts.
- DR 4423 Critical Practices and Contemporary Performance: The students will be expected to reflect on a particular theory that has been discussed and analysed in relation to a certain theatre play. In their Final Project-Portfolio of Research they will be able to focus on their chosen research methodology, between what has been analysed in the module, and provide their own critical/theoretical support in relation to theatre play (s).
- DR 4429 Advanced Directing: Portfolio content includes description of the research methodology used and its critical/theoretical support.
- DR 4570 New Spatialities: Contemporary Performance and Public / Outdoor Space. The course offers the opportunity for students to design, manage and complete a performance project as an independent practice-based artistic research. The students are given the opportunity to develop the capacity to work independently in order to create a methodology and the ability to self-critique and reflection in order to evolve as researchers. These research acts are creative and critical and are conceptualized as a part of the theoretical, structural, interpretive and critical traditions found in the arts.



Revision of modules in the context of the curriculum mapping of the program and the program structure.

Following EE feedback (EE Febr. 2020 Report) suggesting the team considered 'renaming and refocusing' certain modules as well as ensuring that learning material that takes place across two courses is delivered by one module, the focus of certain modules has been refined to 'enhance continuity and integrated structure' within the program (EE July 2020).

Renaming and refocusing certain modules:

Summary of action:

- DR 2012 The Actor's Process has been renamed as DR 2012 Introduction to the craft of Acting. We believe that the title of the course should be more direct and explicit, so that it is very evident to the students what this course is about.
- DR 2032 Stagecraft has been renamed and revised as DR 2032 Introduction to Theatre Production, refocusing the module to an introductory course to theatre production that will give students the foundation knowledge and skills for more complex work later in their studies.
- DR 3101 Movement for the Theatre Practitioner has been renamed and revised as DR 3201 Movement for the Performer to emphasize the 'embodied knowledge' of movement techniques and training for the performer.
- DR 3139 Practical Dramaturgy has been renamed and revised as DR 3339
 Dramaturgy emphasizing the importance of both Practical and Theoretical Dramaturgy.
- DR 3246 Performance as a Political and Social Act: Refocusing of the module in alignment with the new level 4 Introduction to Performance Studies course that is added to the program.
- DR 4241 Advanced Acting was refocused. Emphasis is given on more contemporary acting techniques. A lot of notions and practices from different techniques are integrated to achieve a well-rounded knowledge on the subject.

Revision of content to **enhance continuity and integrated structure** within the program.

- DR 2010 Movement for the Stage module has been designed in order to act as the basis for other movement-related courses of the higher levels, such as DR 3201 Movement for the Performer.
- DR 2220 The Theatrical Event: Revision of content to reflect the new reading materials added and provide the students with the needed theoretical basis for



the L5 courses. New materials are added to keep the course updated to current trends.

- DR 3201 Movement for the Performer: Revision of content:
- to enable the students to develop further the work explored in DR Movement for the Stage.
- > to include added material (on improvisation and non-text-based work) and
- > to foster clearer connections between the voice, movement, and acting modules.
- Bibliography has been revised and updated.
- DR 3246 Performance as a Political and Social Act: Revision of content to create a clear continuity within the three Performance related courses (L4 DR 2336, L5 3246, L6 DR 4570).
- DR 3328 The Directing Process: Reflective presentation that takes place after the performance projects, includes the methodology supported by the theoretical and critical contexts.
- DR 3339 Dramaturgy has included a more theoretical part on Aristotle's dramaturgy, thus making both DR 4521 Classical Tradition in Contemporary Context and DR 4423 Critical Practices more explicitly concentrated on other and various theatre texts and plays. For the same reasons, Bibliography has been changed and updated. Modules WP 1111 Integrated Academic Writing and Ethics and WP 1212 Academic Writing and Research have been added as Prerequisites, in order to help students learn how to write in an academic way, also using correctly their bibliographical references and citations.
- DR 4423 Critical Practices and Contemporary Performance has been concentrated on the 21st century, thus extending what has been taught in DR 3139 Practical Dramaturgy to today. The module has been enriched with various and updated philosophical and artistic trends in contemporary performances, thus giving the opportunity to students to work more analytically in their assessments. Since DR 4780 Final Major Project has been suspended, students will be given the opportunity to work more extensively with their Final Assessment in DR 4423 Critical Practices and Contemporary Performance. Therefore, Bibliography has been updated in the module.
- DR 4429 Advanced Directing: Revision of content to include added materials (on devising theatre theory and techniques) and allow further development of the work students experimented with at DR 3228 The Directing Process.
- DR 4521 Classical Tradition in Contemporary Context: Bibliography has been revised and updated in the module to foster on the specific needs of DR 4521 Classical Tradition in Contemporary Context.

Revision of workload



Following EE feedback that '1 semester courses of 15 credits only really need two assessment points', (EE Report July 2019) the team agreed to reduce the number and in some cases the types of assessments.

- DR 2010 Movement for the Stage. Some modifications in relation to the content of the assessments:
- One short given-in-class movement combination is included in the portfolio of practice in order to assure that students maintain a consistent physical practice related to movement and its elements. This combination will be given by the instructor in the beginning of the semester, practiced each week and assessed in the end of the semester. Through physical repetition the students will acquire body awareness and knowledge, that can be efficiently applied in the three studies. In previous time that this module has ran, the gap between theoretical understanding and practical application was a frequent phenomenon. Whilst the students showed good theoretical understanding, in guite a few cases the physical practice was not consistent. Practicing on a fixed movement combination can assist the embodiment of knowledge in a good degree, creating a bridge between practice and theory. Furthermore, once the combination is well-practiced, improvisational tasks will be initiated, in order to enhance the on-spot alertness of the students. The above-mentioned inclusion addresses L.O. 4. The three short studies remain as such, each one related to a section of the course (non-verbal communication & proxemics, Motion Factors, Space) and building one upon the other.
- One short writing is removed from the portfolio in order to avoid repetition of the same material. Each of the three writings is directly related to one of the abovementioned sections.
- In DR 2015 Voice and Speech I the assessments are reduced from three to two. An oral presentation (40%) and a final performance (60%). The written evaluation of the ongoing work process will be introduced in the discussions in class, as part of a personal voice journal.
- In DR 2032 Introduction to Theatre Production (previously DR 2032 Stagecraft) the assessments are reduced to two.
- In DR 2111 The Space of Performance the number and the percentages have changed:
- Coursework assignment and participation is deleted.
- Portfolio of critical writings (total 2,500-3,000 words) 40% is reduced to Portfolio of critical writings (total 1200 words) 40%.
- Final project: storyboard, basic line drawing/sketches, portfolio of research has been increased from 40% to 60%.



The adapted changes reflect a more balanced wordcount/percentage for an L4 course and emphasize the importance of the students' creative process, linked to the final assessment.

- In DR 2126 Performance in Athens the final assessment is switched from an inclass exam to a take-home exam.
- In DR 3116 Voice and Speech II the three assessments have been modified as follows:
- ➤ Self-Evaluation Voice journal (15%) is deleted.
- Midterm Presentation 35% has increased to First Assessment: Library reading performance Assessment 40%
- Final Presentation 50% has increased to Final Performance: Performance of two contrasting dramatic characters 60%
- In DR 3118 Stage Lighting the assessments are reduced to two.
- In DR 3201 Movement for the Performer the assessments are reduced from three to two and the percentages have been altered. The two previous practical assessments (solo performance 35% and group performance 45%) have been changed to a Performance Presentation (70%). The change emphasizes the importance of a fuller and deeper engagement with the creative process in the development of practice-based work.
- In DR 3327 The Scenographic Space of Performance the assessments have been modified as follows:
- Coursework assignment and participation (20%) is deleted.
- First Assessment: Portfolio of Critical Writings 30% has increased to 40%
- Final Assessment: Project storyboard, model box and portfolio 50% has increased to 60%
- In DR 3339 Dramaturgy, assessments have been reduced to two, from three, fostering more on both history of the Dramaturgy, as well as on its Practical use in a contemporary performance.
- In DR 4241 Advanced Acting, revision of workload and the number of assessments is being proposed. One summative assessment becomes a formative assessment in order to give the students the chance to improve their skills before their summative exams.
- In DR 4423 Critical Practices and Contemporary Performance the First Assessment has been more concentrated lessening the word limit from 2000-2500 words to 1500-1700 and, consequently, augmenting the word limit in the Final Project-Portfolio of Research to 2000-2500 (there was no specific word limit).



In the module DR 4521 Classical Tradition in Contemporary Context assessments have become three from two. The First and Second Assessments have become 1250 words, each, counting for 30%, each, and the Group Presentation is followed by a shorter essay of 1000words, counting for 40%, in order to better meet the demands of the module.

Revision to Theatre Practicums

Summary of action:

The L4 practicum – DR 2461 Introduction to Theatre Practice has been removed because it was proved too early for the students to synthesise and apply to a practicum the skills and knowledge gained during L4. Also, the L5 practicum DR 3762 Theatre as a Collaborative Practice has been revised and renamed DR 3962 Collaborative Performance Practice, as part of the reorientation of the whole program towards Performance and the introduction of the Performance strand as equal to the Theatre one. The revised module includes exploration of various theatre and performance practices, with a particular focus on collaborative performance making. The module engages with a range of theatre and performance practices, explored in a critically informed context and aims to develop the students' understanding of the concepts, processes, and techniques associated with the terms "theatre" and "performance" and will be introduced to the working methods and practices for collaborative performance work. The L6 practicum DR 4819 Senior Production Practicum is designed as an advanced experience in theatre and performance practice giving students the opportunity to work under industrylevel models, and to develop professional portfolio of practice as well as industry-level skills by designing, producing, and managing a 'showcase' performance.

Create new modules that reflect changes in the industry and the subject and thus support employability.

Reflecting current changes in the industry, the emphasis on performance indicates the introduction of the Performance strand as equal to the Theatre one.

Summary of action:

A new module DR 2336 Introduction to Performance has been created as a new and necessary course part of a sequence of 3 (DR 2336 Intro to Performance L4, DR 3246 Performance as a Political & Social Act L5, and DR 4570 New Spatialities: Contemporary Performance and Public / Outdoor Space L6) in alignment with the department's new title.

Following the re-evaluated role of entrepreneurship in the Performing Arts sector two new modules have been created to facilitate the students transition to the current conditions of the industry.



- A new L5 module, DR 3243 Portfolio Design is created to respond to students needs to organize, brand and promote their own work by learning to create professional and advanced forms of portfolios (including print, web and video).
- A new L6 module DR 4454 Creative Producing will follow up the introduction to the collaborative process of creating a production, made by the L4 module DR 2032 Introduction to Theatre Production and will introduce students to the contemporary performing arts industry, focusing on its economy, technology, labor, production, distribution, marketing, and organization. The new module will explore the current practices of media development, from financing to production to distribution to marketing and performance. Students will learn about the contemporary economy and culture of theatre and performance industry allowing them to gain entrepreneurial skills and develop into artists-entrepreneurs.

The team agreed that there is a need to offer students the opportunity to **develop performing skills beyond a more traditional 'acting' and 'directing' approach**. As a result, the new structure has **increased the portfolio of electives** in order to provide comparable opportunities in all aspects of **theatre and performance practice**.

- DR 3142 Improvisation for Acting, L5 will concentrate on improvisation as a key interdisciplinary field of research as the foundation of all practical approaches to performing.
- DR 4148 Musicality in Performance, L6 is designed to enable students to explore musical language as a metaphor for performance making. Students will be trained to develop an embodied understanding of musical concepts and learn how to create a solo performance and a chorus ensemble studying the text as a musical score.
- DR 4351 Physical Play and devising, L6 is rooted in J. Lecoq's pedagogy and is designed to offer a range of tools that develop the performer's scenic language and enhance understanding of the performer's-creator's process in devising practice by extending the range of physical skills and knowledge of modes of performance practice in preparation for entry into the profession.
- DR 4352 The human face in the Arts will offer a range of tools and approaches to explore the importance of the human face in the contemporary performing and visual arts and the fate of the face in the age of mass media; tracing the surprising ways in which facial expressions inform not only the way we understand language, but also other minds and the concept of personhood itself.
- DR 4349 Performing Objects: Materiality, Imagination and Performance, L6 will
 offer students the opportunity to work with nonhuman elements, masks, and
 objects and experience the practice of working with the materiality of performing
 objects in order to contribute to new materialist thinking on the vitality of matter.



Also, the new structure has **increased the portfolio of electives** in order to provide comparable **opportunities in all aspects of theatre practice**, **including dramatic theory**.

Summary of action:

DR 3344 Re-reading Greek Tragedy and the American Drama, L5 has been added to the structure. The module focuses on questions of adaptation, appropriation, and inspiration in general and on the reasons that American playwrights choose to work with the themes dealt with in ancient Greek tragedies at the end of the 20th and in the 21st century.

Significantly, the team acknowledged that there was a lack of modules explicitly engaging with technology.

Summary of action:

 DR 4455 Digital Performance has been designed to incorporate and integrate computer technologies and multimedia into any type of production and provide knowledge of current applications of new technologies for theatre and performance.

DR 4819 Senior Production Practicum Capstone:

DR 4780 Final major Project has been deleted. The necessary transferable skills are now acquired through the following modules: DR 4570 New Spatialities: Contemporary Performance and Public / Outdoor Space, DR 4429 Advanced Directing, DR 4423 Critical Practices and Contemporary Performance. Students create Portfolios of Practice that will prepare them for entering the industry and/or graduate studies. They are also encouraged to involve themselves in the development of a complete research project as both a body of individual work and integrated part of the collective performance event. Last, DR 4819 Senior Production Practicum becomes the current Capstone of the programme. In this module, students engage in professional practice in a variety of roles and they develop methodologies as they work towards a full-scale production.

DA 4069 Physical Theatres

The DA 4069 Physical Theatres module, which was a Level 6 elective, part of the Dance program, is now deleted. A new module, entitled DR 4351 Physical Play and Devising, has been created. The module, which is rooted in J. Lecoq's pedagogy, is designed to engage students in movement work and physical training, improvisation, and devised performance. The modules DR 2010 Movement for the Stage, DR 2012 The Actor's Process, DR 3201 Movement for the Performer (Previously DR 3101 Movement for the Theatre Practitioner) have been added as prerequisites to ensure that all students have a solid foundation of physical practice.
