A Slight Ache, in Pinter's characteristic tragiocomic style, delves deep into our fear of growing old and our perception of the Other as a threat to our own identity. In this absurdist "comedy of menace", games of domination emerge through

mundane dialogues in an atmosphere of suspense.

This production, created by young adults, replaces Pinter's tired, regretful, old characters with vibrant, anxious, young characters who are afraid of succumbing to the archetypes that the play portrays. However, the fear of aging into an unfulfilled version of ourselves is an unavoidable part of human existence.

Four powerful performers, each with her special movement quality and choreographic vocabulary, meet on stage and take us into a world where the body is exposed to the passing of time, pain, expectations, the views of others, but also to its own obsessions, desires and inner struggles.
