The history of The American College of Greece (ACG) between 2008 and 2023 coincides with one of the most turbulent economic and political periods in the history of modern Greece. As U.S. Ambassador to Greece from 2010-2013, I worked to help Greece during part of this tumultuous time. That Greece has emerged from its deep and protracted financial crisis with such vigor and more recently coped with the COVID-19 pandemic as effectively as any Western country is a testament to the resilience of the Greek people as well as the quality of the nation's current leadership.

The fact that ACG not only survived but as documented in this report, thrived and expanded over this 15-year period dominated by unforeseen and substantial challenges in its external operating environment is no less noteworthy. The enrollment growth, the diversity and quality of the student body, the expansion of academic programs and facilities, the strengthening of the credentials and scholarly production of the faculty, the outreach to and impact on the community, the engagement of alumni and external supporters, and the reinforcement of the institution's governance and financial foundations have positioned ACG for a promising future.

As ACG approaches its 150th year since its founding in Smyrna in 1875 and as it has just recently marked and celebrated the College's 100 years of service to Greece, we could not be more proud of what ACG has become nor more optimistic about its future!

Statement

In this academic year (2023-24) I am completing my 40th year as a college/university president. 

With the opening of its new renovated and expanded East Campus, The American College of Greece welcomed **Kindergarten and Elementary** students in **2022-2023**.





The 27-acre East Campus in Spata, near the Athens International Airport, is a 10-minute drive from the Aghia Paraskevi main campus. Opened in 2022, the campus hosts a Pre-K-6 elementary school and will host the Pierce middle school (Gymnasium) and high school (Lyceum) with the construction of additional buildings over the next 3-5 years.

Pierce has been a model of educational vision and excellence since its founding as a school for Armenian, Greek, Jewish, and Turkish girls in 1875. Pierce's educational philosophy emphasizes creating an environment that fosters high academic achievement, communal and civic responsibility, and emotional intelligence; celebrates creativity and innovation, and instills a lifelong love of learning.

In **2016-17** Pierce officially became an IB World School In five graduating classes and almost 200 students:

- 100% entered a first choice university
- 6 scored the maximum 45 points
- Average score of 35.4 (4 points above world average)

An experiential three-week summer program in leader-ship for international and local students, 13-17 years old. The Academy's goals are to stimulate intellectual curiosity, expose students to leadership concepts and pathways, and cultivate skills necessary for aspiring leaders, regardless of their sphere of endeavor. Since **2016**, over 430 students have participated in the program.





Pierce Jewish Studies Program funded by the Jewish Community of Athens and the Ronald S. Lauder Foundation

A model program to support European Jewish communities decimated by the Holocaust. The goal of the program is for students to feel comfortable within a Jewish community and familiar with the vast world of Jewish culture and practices. The program advances students' knowledge in two primary areas: Jewish history, traditions and culture and Hebrew language. Since **2017**, 65 students have participated in the program.

Pierce is the 1st Greek national curriculum school with U.S. accreditation in all educational levels

Pierce completed the initial Middle States Association (MSA) secondary education accreditation process, which typically takes 2 to 6 years, in just 16 months (2022). MSA accreditation was extended to the P-K-6 division in 2023.











Since 2008, the Deree curriculum has expanded to 32 undergraduate majors, 6 cooperative programs with Clarkson University and 9 graduate programs.

Since **2011**, more than 2,000 Deree and AGBS students have completed credit and non-credit internships, apprenticeships and practical training in 15 countries, funded by over 200 companies and organizations.







The ACG International Internship program was initiated in **2011** in cooperation with the Libra Group. Student interns are assigned to one of Libra's subsidiaries, primarily in shipping, aviation, hospitality, real estate and renewable energy, based in one of 18 locations (e.g., New York, Miami, London, Athens, Beijing

Buenos Aires). Over 100 Deree students have completed Libra internships.



In **2014**, ACG launched an "outbound" study abroad program with tuition-exchange. Over 400 students have studied abroad in outstanding U.S. colleges and universities (e.g., Boston College, Emory University, University of Virginia) and universities around the world.



In **2020**, ACG announced a collaboration with the John S. Latsis Public Benefit Foundation for study abroad scholarships. Parallel Studies and full-time undergraduate Deree students are supported to study abroad at European and other international institutions



Launched in **2012**, the International Honors Program has provided over 300 high achieving Deree undergraduates the academic enrichment of specially-designed courses and multi-disciplinary research.



International Honors students may apply to Stanford University's Summer International Honors Program, a collaboration between Stanford University and over 30 international institutions in 17 countries including The American College of Greece. Since 2012, 35 Deree students have attended the Stanford program.

Beginning in Fall **2019**, the ACG-Clarkson International Scholars Program (ISP) offers highly qualified students two years of study at ACG-Deree, followed by two years at Clarkson University (NY). Students receive a bachelor's degree in one of the following Clarkson majors:

In **2012**, ACG and AGBS formed a strategic alliance to advance their respective leadership positions. AGBS relocated to the ACG Downtown Athens Campus. In **2017**, AGBS was formally integrated into ACG.





SEV Center of Excellence in Creative Leadership

Established in **2018** with a founding donation from SEV (Federation of Greek Industries), the Center aspires to support and advance the values and practices of creative leadership in Greek society and beyond.



AGBS launched its first fully online, AMBA accredited, MBA degree in December **2022**, offering five student intakes per year.



In **2022**, AGBS offered an innovative program - Evolving Learners - to support AGBS alumni in taking their business knowledge and leadership potential to the next level.

Transformative Scholarship - ACG Research Center



Since **2020**, the ACG Research Center serves as the prime vehicle for hosting funded research (e.g., European Commission projects) and technology innovation activities undertaken by faculty members in all ACG divisions, as well as members and fellows of ACG's Institutes and Centers of Excellence.

Recruit, train and supervise 11 doctoral students to pursue PhD degrees on research topics related to the emerging area of integrated sensing and communications.

Parallel Studies Program

Students pursuing ACG studies concurrently with enrollment in Greek public universities – now known as "Parallel Study" – has a long and distinguished tradition at ACG (e.g., at least two Rhodes Scholars). In **2014**, the Stavros Niarchos Foundation (SNF) initiated the SNF Scholars Program to support the educational aspirations of high-achieving Greek public university students. With SNF merit-based scholarships supplemented by ACG merit- and need-based scholarships, the SNF Scholars Program significantly expanded participation in Parallel Study.

Since 2014, over 900 SNF Scholars and 2,000 other Parallel Study students have benefited from the opportunity to study at Deree. In **2018**, SNF transitioned it's generous annual grants to a \$1.8 million endowment ensuring the future of this distinctive public/private sector initiative.



Launched in **2011**, **Deree Sports Academy and ACG Fitness** serve over 2,000 children and local community members annually.















In **2019** and with input from students, ACG introduced its first mascot – the **Griffin**. With the head of an eagle and body of a lion, the griffin has long represented a powerful guardian, a protector of valuables and values deriving its strength from the combination of two natures. Adopted by early Greeks, inhabiting a land situated between east and west, Asia and Europe, this symbol of different creatures united in purpose but retaining their individual powers epitomizes the unique qualities of ACG.



Established in **2017** in collaboration with the U.S. Embassy in Athens, **Education Unites** provides a path for refugee students in Greece to commence or continue their undergraduate or graduate studies at ACG.

Through the program, ACG has welcomed over 200 refugee students from Syria, Afghanistan, Iran, parts of the Middle East, as well as countries in Africa and, more recently, Ukraine.



This is to inform you that at its meeting on Tuesday, October 18, 2022, the Massachusetts Board of Higher Education approved the application of the American University of Greece to incorporate in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and to offer the following degrees:

On October 18, 2022, the Massachusetts Board of Higher Education (MBHE) approved The American University of Greece (AUG) as a new institution in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, culminating a two-year application and review process. Massachusetts sets a high bar for its higher education institutions, which include some of the world's most prestigious – Harvard, MIT, Tufts, Northeastern, Boston College, Boston University. Being authorized by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to award university degrees for study at ACG under AUG's institutional NECHE accreditation provides our graduates with an even stronger U.S. and international credential.

Cultivate a high performance, sustainable organizational culture based on transparency, mutual support, collegiality, and continuous improvement by: enhancing collegial governance rooted in a highly functioning board, faculty and staff; assuring externally competitive and internally equitable compensation.







Between **2008** and **2023**, new compensation scales, based on independent, market-based research, were implemented for all ACG personnel categories to assure external competitiveness and internal equity.



In **2022**, implementation of a Deree Faculty Development Plan resulted in change of status for 69 faculty, reduced teaching loads of research-active faculty from eight to seven courses per year, and an increased percentage of courses taught by full-time faculty from 50% to 79%.

Establish ACG's educational leadership position in Greece, broaden awareness in the Greek diaspora and build a culture of constituency engagement and philanthropy by supporting institutional priorities (e.g., student financial aid, campus development), signature academic and co-curricular programs, and community outreach, and investing in advancement (e.g., alumni engagement, fundraising), public affairs, public events, and marketing and communications initiatives.










Development and Alumni Relations


Annual fundraising has increased from \$567,656 in 2008-09 to an annual average of \$1,786,477 between 2009-10 and 2016-17, and \$4,333,047 between 2017-18 and 2022-23, the first six years of the ACG 150 Campaign.




Student financial aid and ACG 150 Institutes and Centers of Excellence have attracted the strongest support.

GOAL



In **2022**, the 27-acre East Campus in Spata, a 10-minute drive from the main campus and near the Athens International Airport, opened as host for the new Pre-K -6 Pierce Elementary School. Pierce Gymnasium/ Middle School (Grades 7-9) and Lyceum/High School (Grades 10 –12) will transfer to the new campus facilities following construction of additional buildings in the next 3-5 years.



Built in **2017** and funded substantially by USAID and the National Bank of Greece, Greece's first Simulated Trading Room provides state of the art resources for ACG students and the wider community.

Campus Projects - Library Renovation

In **2019**, The John S. Bailey Library, the heart of ACG's academic infrastructure, was renovated and is now home to:


- 129,000 books & 316,000 e-books
- 12 million academic articles & many more from magazines and other periodicals
- 1 million digital images
- 2,500 DVDs, videos, and CDs

The library also houses the ACG Archives and Special Collections.









Funded by a generous grant from the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID), the Digital Museum on the Library's main floor showcases archival material related to ACG's history from its founding in 1875 to the present. In June **2022**, the Digital Museum was dedicated to Dr. S. Sue Horner's memory in recognition of her originating vision for the project.



Campus Projects - Residences









In **2009**, three college-owned residence halls were converted from staff and guest housing to student residences. In **2017**, Residence IV (84 beds) was added, followed by Residence V (99 beds) in **2023**, bringing the total College-owned student accommodation capacity to 361 beds. Annually, the College-owned student residences and rented apartments accommodate over 1,000 students.

In 2022-23, net tuition & fees (gross tuition & fees minus student financial aid) represent 82% of total revenue, with the remaining 18% provided primarily by philanthropy: endowment / reserves draw and expendable fundraising. Instruction accounts for the largest share of non-capital related, operating expenses, consuming 40% of net tuition & fees, followed by institutional support (26%), student services & auxiliary operations – e.g., student residence halls (19%), academic support & research (11%).

Sustainability





ACG featured as a top performer in AASHE's 2023 Sustainable Campus Index (SCI) eight consecutive years - one of only two institutions outside the U.S., Canada, and Australia to be included.

ACG has achieved a **STARS Gold Rating** from the Association for the Advancement for Sustainability in Higher Education (AASHE), joining prestigious U.S. universities such as MIT, Princeton, Tufts, University of Pennsylvania, Yale.



ACG is one of the 420 'greenest' colleges and the only European institution according to **The Princeton Review** for **2022**. This is the fourth time ACG has been included in this list.



In **2018**, ACG established an MoU with **Boroume** to participate in the organization's farmers' market initiative "Boroume stin laiki" by adopting a farmers' market in Cholargos. The market collects food donated by vendors and supplies a local church that hosts a daily soup kitchen.



ACG has marked a significant milestone in its ongoing commitment to energy efficiency, acquiring in **2020** and renewing in 2023 the **ISO 50001** certification for its Energy Management System. ACG has also received the **ISO 14064-1** for monitoring, managing and improving its performance in greenhouse gas emissions management.
